

HOW ARE SYRIAN REFUGEES PORTRAYED IN CANADIAN AND GERMAN NEWSPAPERS?

TITLE OF RESEARCH: Refugee Reception and Perception in Germany and Canada

SUMMARY: This analysis of the representations of Syrian refugees in one newspaper in Germany and one in Canada confirms that both newspapers reflect the national traditions of their respective countries.

By analyzing articles from the Globe and Mail and Süddeutsche Zeitung in the fall of 2015, the researchers aimed to see how national identity and refugee reception were articulated in the German and Canadian media.

Both newspapers reflect the national traditions of their respective countries

- Germany: an 'ethnic' nation, with a shared language, culture and ancestry
- Canada: a 'multicultural' nation, with an ethnically and culturally diverse population

The research adds important nuance

- In Germany, increasing acceptance of the idea of integrating 'others'
- In Canada, some complacency around refugee integration within a self-proclaimed 'caring' nation

Themes in the Media Coverage



negative compared to that of other refugee groups



- Perception that refugees threaten public safety
- as generous, benevolent, and playing a vital role in refugee integration; while refugees' agency in their own integration is not recognized.

Recommendations:

- Planned integration of refugees/asylum seekers is crucial to improve public perception.
- Oivil society activism can steer public opinion towards greater acceptance of immigrants.
